A message from Peter Lennox, Unit Commander of 11 Division

On Tuesday December 29 2009, Kenneth Mark had his life taken from him. By all accounts Mr. Mark was a fine, law abiding man. He was leaving a local pizza store when he was shot. This deadly attack was a criminal event that specifically targeted Mr. Mark. People believed responsible for this attack have been arrested and brought before the courts. I would like to extend my condolences to Mr. Mark's family and friends. I would also like to thank the members of Toronto Police Service's Homicide Squad, the officers of 11 Division for their efforts and professionalism, and finally members of the community who assisted us with this investigation. Later in this bulletin you will find more information pertaining to this homicide.

No. 11 Division has experienced a sharp rise in thefts from automobiles in the past few weeks. We have provided the community with a substantial amount of information through public meetings, the Community Police Liaison Committee (CPLC), pamphlets distributed by Auxiliary officers, e-mailing and communication through local councillors' offices. These "target-hardening" and public-information efforts were supplemented by an active operational initiative. "Project Broken Window" took place between January 21 and 27. We have recently arrested a number of culprits, and will continue to be vigilant and pursue those who are responsible for crimes that negatively impact the quality of life in our community. Later in this bulletin can be found both related crime prevention information and sign up instructions for community alerts and TPS links, two methods by which the Toronto Police Service shares information with the community. Additionally, PC Russ Golding our crime prevention officer can also be contacted to answer crime prevention questions or to provide any additional crime prevention material you might need.

Remember, be aware, be safe, be informed and be involved.

ARREST OF THE MONTH



Home Invasion

The victims were attending a party at a Sterling Road address when two masked intruders armed with a machete and a 2X4 forced their way into the residence.

The suspects forcibly confined the victims in a bedroom and proceeded to ransack the apartment making demands for valuables.

One of the victims was able to hide from the intruders and call 911.

Officers from 11 Division responded immediately.

Prior to the arrival of the police one of the suspects fled the scene.

Once on scene officers secured the scene and called everyone out. The victims identified the remaining accused who was attempting to conceal his identity by mingling with the victims. The accused was arrested and transported to 11 Division. He was investigated and charged accordingly.

The investigation is still ongoing.

Thefts from Autos

The division has recently been experiencing an increased number of thefts from autos in specific areas. Vehicles have been damaged and property has been stolen. The impact on the community is easily identifiable. An initiative was created to address this concern. The combined intensified efforts of 11 Division's crime management team, plain clothes officers and uniform personnel have yielded results. A number of arrests have been made. The most notable arrest to date was made on Wednesday the 20th of January 2010. **This arrest alone has resulted in 77 charges being laid against a lone man.**

This one-man crime wave resulted in a wide variety of criminal allegations including several counts of Theft Under \$5,000.00, Mischief Under \$5,000.00, Possession of Property Obtained by Crime, Attempt Fraud Under, Personation with Intent, Use Credit Card Obtained by Crime, Fail to Comply with Probation, Fail to Comply Recognizance, Obstruct Peace Officer, Disguise with Intent, Assault with Intent to Resist Arrest, Assaulting a Peace Officer and Possession of Burglar Tools.

Accused: KRASNICI, Fatmir (DOB1975.05.07)

The accused was held pending a bail hearing.

CHILD SAFETY SEATS



The Toronto Police Service offers free inspection of your child safety seat installation at many of our stations. As Toronto Police Service members provide this inspection in addition to their regular duties, please call ahead and book an appointment. If you just show up at a station you may be disappointed. New parents please call well in advance of your expected due date.

To properly install your seat, please read both your child safety seat instruction booklet and your vehicle owner's manual. We will happily inspect your installation. Any seat that is installed incorrectly will be made right before you leave.

Where can I get help in Toronto and the Greater Toronto Area?

The Toronto Police Service offers car seat inspection at many divisions. This free service is offered on an **appointment-only** basis. Additionally, the T.P.S., in conjunction with Child Safety Seat Coalition, offers open seat clinics at various times during the year. Please contact your nearest division for an appointment.

On Tuesday the 12th of January 2010 at 1:17 p.m. police responded to a personal injury collision at Dundas Street West and Roncesvalles Avenue.

It is reported that a 20 year old man driving a Ford van was travelling southbound on Dundas Street West, approaching Roncesvalles Avenue. The vehicle proceeded through the intersection on a green traffic signal and struck two pedestrians, an 80 year old woman and her 42 year old son.

The pedestrians were crossing Dundas Street West from the west side to the east side in an area that clearly directs pedestrians to cross on the south side of the intersection. The man was taken to hospital with non-life threatening injuries.

The woman was taken to hospital, where she later passed away.

COLLISION REPORTING CENTRES - Involved in a fender bender

The Collision Reporting Centres of Toronto are partnerships between the Toronto Police Service, insurance providers and private enterprise. The concept of self-reporting collisions is the main function of the Collision Reporting Centres. Drivers involved in property damage collisions **MUST** report within twenty four hours to a Collision Reporting Centre, where a police officer inspects the vehicle damage.

The driver then completes a simplified government collision report form which is checked by a police officer. Once the reports are completed, drivers may make use of the Insurance Services offered at the Centres. In some cases, the driver's own insurance provider is represented on site. This allows for the timely reporting of the collision to the insurance provider and an early resolution of the claim process.

This simplified process is a service to the driving public. Property damage collisions are handled in an efficient manner with more consideration given to the convenience of the driver and the time restraints on a busy population.

It is reported that police located a 29 year old man with apparent trauma to the body. He was taken to hospital with life threatening injuries and later died in hospital.

The deceased has been identified as 29 year old Kenneth Mark of Toronto.

Thefts from vehicles

Recently, there have been a number of thefts from autos in 11 Division.

It is important to remember not to leave valuables of any kind in your vehicle. This includes global positioning systems, laptops, cell phones, wallets, purses, briefcases, cash or identification including vehicle ownership and insurance. An empty gym bag or a handful of change may be significant enough to draw criminal interest in your vehicle. Even leaving the suction cup mounting system for the GPS on the windshield may cause the criminal to believe something of value has been left in your car. Thieves have even been known to look for the residual ring on windshield glass when the suction cup is removed.

Although nothing of value may be available to be stolen, the cost of repairs to broken car windows and the inconvenience caused to you makes it advisable to remove all such accessories from sight. This is true even if the vehicle is parked in an underground garage.

- If you must leave valuables in your vehicle, while shopping for example, please ensure all items are locked in the trunk.
- Personal safety and theft prevention are always important things to keep in mind. Remember many crimes are crimes of opportunity. Criminals are people watchers and they are mobile.
- Always be aware of your surroundings. Look and listen. Walk with a purpose and with confidence. Do not overburden your hands with parcels. Have your car keys ready and available to unlock your vehicle. Have your car keys and house keys on different key rings.
- When parking your vehicle always lock it and roll up the windows. **Never leave the vehicle running while unattended.** You should try and park in areas that are both well lit and well travelled. Never leave a spare key in the vehicle. Before getting into your parked car look into the front and rear compartments.
- All crimes should be reported to the police immediately. Hesitate only long enough to ensure your safety.
- **All suspicious events and people should be reported to the police immediately. Confrontation with suspicious people or suspected criminals is not recommended.**
- If a crime has occurred do not touch anything or clean up until the police have inspected for evidence. Note the description of any suspicious person and the licence plate of any suspicious vehicle.

CRIME PREVENTION TIPS

DO NOT BECOME A VICTIM OF STREET ROBBERY

Purpose

Your safe-being and security is of paramount concern to the Toronto Police Service. The intent of this pamphlet is to make teenagers aware that they are potential targets for street robbers and suggest some measures that can be taken to prevent those types of robberies. In the event of a robbery this pamphlet will provide a course of action that will reduce the risk of personal injury and increase the potential of bringing the person(s) to justice.

1. Tell others where you are going and when you are expected to return.

2. Don't walk alone, especially after dark
 3. Follow the safest route possible. Avoid short cuts and deserted areas; try to keep to well-lit busy streets after dark. Walk on the side of the street where you can best see around you.
 4. Avoid parks and green spaces after dark.
 5. Walk with a purpose and be alert and aware of your surroundings. Avoid using personal stereos or radios – you might not hear trouble approaching.
 6. Don't flash your cash, iPods, mobile phones or other valuables. Keep their use discreet and put them away after use. Don't carry them or show them in an obvious manner.
 7. If you feel threatened or fearful strangers while outside, remember that all 911 calls are free of charge and can be dialed from any telephone booth.
 8. Do not delay in calling the police, even if the robber has threatened you; hesitate only long enough to ensure your safety, then call immediately. The faster the police are able to respond, the better the chances the robber(s) will be arrested. Your safety is paramount, never chase or follow a robber.
 9. If you are robbed, the following information is very important to the police:
 - the suspect's direction of travel
 - the time of the robbery
 - whether or not the suspect(s) had any weapons
 - the number of suspects involved
 10. If a vehicle was used, a description of the vehicle and direction of travel if known; and description of suspect(s). Ask any witnesses to wait until the police arrive. Get their names and addresses if they can not stay.
 11. If you're a victim of a street robbery don't argue, don't fight and don't use weapons. Robbers are unpredictable and resistance in any form may escalate the level of violence.
 12. Memorize suspect(s) physical and clothing descriptions, especially tattoos, scars and other prominent features
 13. When trying to determine age, height, weight and appearance, compare them to yourself or people that you know.
 14. If a weapon is used, focus your attention on its size, type and colour.

TPS LINKS

Welcome to the Toronto Police Service Community Automated Notification System

In support of Community Mobilization efforts, The Toronto Police Service (TPS) is pleased to introduce the TPSlinks system. TPSlinks is community automated notification system that delivers vital information to residents and business owners within the city of Toronto. TPSlinks will utilize sophisticated software by strategically sending information to a selected geographic area made possible through a community member sign-up webpage. Messages will be prepared and delivered by local Divisional Toronto Police Service officers through voice and text messaging. Message types and user delivery profiles can be tailored to meet the needs and preferences for each registered community member. Community members can choose to change their profile or unsubscribe at anytime.

Types of Messages

TPSlinks will transmit messages using landline and cellular telephone options. The registration page enables community members to create a user profile which will specify the message types that the community member wishes to receive and restrict the types that are not desired. TPSlinks will send informative messages ranging from city events to safety notifications and emergency incidents. The following are examples of message types that will be delivered:

- Special Events
- Community Meetings
- Road Closures
- School Lockdowns
- Critical Incident Notifications
- Missing Person Notifications
- Citizen Evacuations
- Suspicious Person Notifications

How do I register?

Residents and business owners within the city of Toronto who wish to enrol to TPSlinks are provided with two registration methods as described below.

They can register online via the Toronto Police Service internet site or complete a hardcopy form available online and at their local police station. Community members will be required to create a TPSlinks user profile by completing all required fields on the TPSlinks registration form. The user profile will increase the speed in which the system delivers messages, and will identify the geographic area where the messages are to be delivered. Community members also have the option to edit their online user profile or unsubscribe at any time. To unsubscribe, simply go to the registration page, open your user profile and select the deregister button at the bottom of the page. Your information and all identifiers will be removed and subsequent messages will not be delivered. To change an existing user profile, select edit with the user profile and make the appropriate changes. The changes will occur immediately.

What to Expect

Phone Message Option

Community members who select messages to be delivered to their home or cellular telephone will receive calls from TPSlinks with a pre-recorded message. If the telephone is not answered, the TPSlinks will leave a message at the end of the voice mail greeting.

Text Message Option

Community members who choose the text message option will receive text messages from TPSlinks on their cellular or blackberry devices. Please note your phone carrier may charge you for incoming text messages.

Who will Receive Messages?

TPSlinks is available to all community members who work or live in the city of Toronto. Long distance phone numbers will not be accessible and messages will not be delivered to these numbers.

Requirements

Community members signing up for TPSlinks, dependant upon the mode of messages receipt, will require:

a telephone or cellular telephone number that is currently in service

or a valid e-mail address for login purposes

When the Toronto Police Service sends a message, the address provided by the community member on the registration page will be used and all community members who are within the selected geographical area will receive the message. If information was not entered, or entered improperly, the appropriate message will not be delivered.

SCHOOL CROSSING GUARD INFORMATION



The Toronto Police Service invites you to apply for the position of School Crossing Guards to work in 11 Division.

Your main duty will be to ensure that all school-aged children up to including grade six students cross the street safely. You may as a courtesy assist older children, adults, elderly citizens, the disabled or any other person you feel would benefit from your assistance. The salary for this position is \$10.67 per hour, with a 12% travel allowance and 4% vacation pay equal to a total of \$12.38 hourly. Positions are available for either regular shifts or on an on call basis.

Qualifications required:

Applicants must be eligible to work in Canada.

Applicants must be a minimum of 18 years of age.

Applicants must have the ability to communicate in English.

All applicants must pass a vision test.

All applicants must provide a Certificate of Fitness from their family physician confirming that they are physically fit to carry out the duties of a crossing guard.

Applicants must not have been convicted of a criminal offence for which a pardon has not been obtained. If a pardon was obtained, proof of pardon must be provided.

A Security check will be conducted.

COMMUNITY ALERTS

Community alerts are e-mails used to warn citizen subscribers in a timely manner of criminal events or other police related matters that are going on in the division (their neighbourhood) and that may affect them, their family or their business. To receive community alerts directly to your desktop please follow the instructions below.

1. Go to www.torontopolice.on.ca
2. Once the Toronto Police Service web site home page is displayed then click on Police Stations (found on the left hand side of page under subtitle "Serving Toronto").
3. A page entitled "Divisional Policing Command" will be displayed. On the right hand side of the page under the heading Central Field, 40 College St. will be found 11 Division, 209 Mavety St. among eight other stations. Click on 11 Division.
4. The 11 Division web page will be displayed. In the top right corner of the page is a blue box with the phrase " Sign-up for Community Alerts". Click on this.
5. You will then be shown a page entitled " Toronto Police Service Mailing Lists". Directly below this title you will find "Sign-up" or four lines below this title you will find "Sign-up here to start receiving news and information today". Click either one.
6. You will then be shown a "Toronto Police Service Mailing Lists - Sign Up" page, asking for name, e-mail address (twice) and a password. Fill in the fields requested and then just to the right mid-page is a blue box asking for you to "Select mailing lists". Pick the ones you want.
7. Subsequent to this procedure you may receive an e-mail asking you to confirm that you have signed up to receive community alerts. Just follow the directions found in the e-mail and will start receiving community alerts.
