Rear-Facing Seat

- Required by law for children weighing less than 9 kg (20lb).
- Best to use until at least one year old and a minimum of 10 kg (22lb). Follow manufacturer's recommendations for height/weight.
- Harness slots at or below shoulders and seat is reclined to a 45 degree angle.

Forward-Facing Seat

- Required by law for children weighing between 9 and 18 kg (20-40lb).
- Best to use when child is at least one year old and a minimum of 10 kg (22lb). Follow manufacturer's recommendations for height/weight.
- Harness slots at or above shoulders.

Booster Seat

- Required by law for children under the age of 9, weighing between 18 kg and 36 kg (40 -80lb) and less than 145 cm (4'9") tall. Once a child exceeds any one of the above criteria they may be ready to use a seat belt alone.
- The middle of the child's ear should not be above the back of the vehicle seat, headrest or booster seat.

- ❖ year and make of vehicle that the car seat is in
- ❖ number of car seats in the vehicle
- ❖ the age of the child or children.

The purpose of these clinics is to have Certified Technicians check to ensure that you have installed your car seat correctly.

It is important to have the seat properly installed well before the baby's due date as clinics and appointments are limited in quantity and there is a very high demand for this service. Thank you for your support and interest in this worthwhile program.

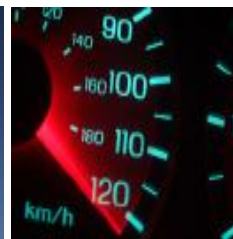
Traffic Talk with Sergeant Henry Wojdylo

REMINDER



78.1 (1) No person shall drive a motor vehicle on a highway while holding or using a hand-held wireless communication device or other prescribed device that is capable of receiving or transmitting telephone communications, electronic data, mail or text messages.

78.1 (2) No person shall drive a motor vehicle on a highway while holding or using a hand-held electronic entertainment device or other prescribed device the primary use of which is unrelated to the safe operation of the motor vehicle. 2009,

78. (1) No person shall drive a motor vehicle on a highway if the display screen of a television, computer or other device in the motor vehicle is visible to the driver.



- cross the road at proper signalized intersections or clearly marked crossing zones.
 - Just like Drivers , avoid distractions – (Cell-phones, Ipod's, MP3's, etc.)



Officers will be paying particular attention to those motorists, cyclists and pedestrians who commit offences in the vicinity of pedestrian crossovers, crosswalks, mid-block, and intersections, school zones (particularly primary schools), and crossing areas frequented by seniors, which jeopardize pedestrian safety. Pedestrians are encouraged to avoid using distracting electronic devices when interacting with vehicular traffic.

Community Automated Communication System

Stay Informed - Stay Safe - Get linked

Overview

In support of Community Mobilization efforts, The Toronto Police Service (TPS) is pleased to introduce the TPSlinks system. TPSlinks is a community automated notification system that delivers vital information to residents and business owners within the city of Toronto. TPSlinks will utilize sophisticated software by strategically sending information to a selected geographic area made possible through a community member sign-up webpage. Messages will be prepared and delivered by local Divisional Toronto Police Service officers through email, voice and text messaging. Message types and user delivery profiles can be tailored to meet the needs and preferences for each registered community member. Community members can choose to change their profile or unsubscribe at anytime.

Types of Messages

TPSlinks will transmit messages using landline and cellular telephone options. The registration page enables community members to create a user profile which will specify the message types that the community member wishes to receive and restrict the types that are not desired. TPSlinks will send informative messages ranging from city events to safety notifications and emergency incidents. The following are examples of message types that will be delivered:

- Road Closures
- Community Events
- Information Alerts
- Existing Amber Alerts
- Missing Persons
- Emergency Incidents
- Neighbourhood Crime Alerts
- Severe Weather Alerts Threats to School Safety
